### **Music Scholars Trip**

The CHSG Music Scholars, along with Miss Ogden and Mr Conduit-Smith, had the joy of going to watch 'Come from Away' at The Phoenix Theatre as part of their scholarship programme in December. 'Come from Away' portrays the story of groups of people who were impacted by the grounding of planes after the 9/11 attack. Students thought that this would be a harrowing and strange concept for a musical, but all were pleasantly surprised and enjoyed the experience.

Before the show, we were greeted by Joseph Smith, one of the producers of the show who kindly aided us with this experience. He showed the students the stage and discussed the Gaelic influences in the musical and where the band would be sitting. He explained that the staging was basic, using just chairs, two tables, costumes and a revolving stage and that there were 12 performers on stage (all who multi-role) and 7 musicians at the side of stage. Our scholars were very concerned when they heard the drummer was in a room on his own under the stage, but then once the show started they realised the importance of this as he would overpower the voices. Students were able to ask questions about the process of putting a show on in the West End and asked some fantastic questions to him.

All of the students were outstanding in portraying excellence during this trip and all loved the experience and it has given them a taste of West End shows. This half term, we have been focusing on roles within the music industry and this experience had some of them exclaiming "I want to do that!" and be involved. We discussed the diversity of roles and people involved in putting on a production and how it is not just the small cast you see on stage and students were shocked at the level of detail expected in the sound engineering, lighting, costume and performing.

Students will be using this experience to assist with their Arts Award scheme, in which they have to write a review about a live experience of a music event. I look forward to reading their reviews of the show in the new year and for our next trip too! Many thanks as well to Ms Nadeem in her help organising this trip, it was greatly appreciated by all.


### **TUTOR READS**

**7G1** are reading **Can You See Me?** This is a story of autism, empathy and kindness that will touch readers of all ages. ...Tally's autism means there are things that bother her even though she wishes they didn't. It means that some people misunderstand, her and feel frustrated by her. An endearing, insightful and warmly uplifting novel.

**Imogen R & Soumya M:** "We like this book because it is creative and interesting. We can't wait to see what happens next."





see students tackle the topic of discrimination in our society with seriousness and the upmost respect. Students were able to discuss our diversity and be aware of differences that make us all unique – they were mature, aware and celebrated all who are part of #team8CHSG.

Year 8 joined the rest of staff and students to donate items for our Christmas Hampers. This was a wonderful opportunity for them to put into action some of the learning on kindness that they had received.

All students were eager to get involved – tutor groups requested more than one box for their items! It was a fantastic opportunity to give back to our local community at what has been and continues to be a challenging time. The expectations that come with year 11 have been a huge step up from what we are used to. However, the school and SLT team have significantly helped to bridge the gap. Interventions, for example, have provided a priceless opportunity to fill any gaps in our learning, especially now that we are running out of time to relearn entire topics. The personalised atmosphere is far more effective than a standard lesson and is invaluable for those who find it difficult to motivate themselves to study at home. In addition to interventions, the science department provides a revision café, to act as a calm, approachable space to further your studies.

In terms of pastoral support, we have had access to a variety of stress relief workshops. These workshops cover a whole range of topics, including the causes of anxiety, signs from your body that your stress levels are getting too high, and grounding techniques to settle your nerves, particularly before exams. Furthermore, the Personal Development Programs that we complete during afternoon form ensure we are well informed and wellrounded individuals, on subjects such as marriage, parental responsibilities, misogyny and trust. To further enforce this, we have participated in multiple PSHE drop-down days, that have allowed us a deeper insight into struggles with mental health, bullying and more sensitive topics like sexual harassment and assault.

To conclude, the pressures of our mock exams and our inevitable GCSE exams has not been easy for any of us. However, the support and inspiration from the school, including our reward pink t-shirts and all the effort poured into making us feel as prepared as we can be for our exams and future in general, has made all the difference.

### Ceridwen


Ceridwen is a choral scholar and over the Christmas period she will be taking part in many services, ranging from lessons, Carol services and Midnight Mass.


