
- Puberty and growing up

In lessons, students had opportunities to ask questions and take part in discussions.



Literacy focus

This week, we are reviewing the tutor reads book for 8R2. 8R2 have been reading Roll of Thunder Hear my Cry by Mildred Taylor. The story deals with the cruel and unjust treatment of black people by the Southern white society they live in during the Depression era (1933). The story is told from the



perspective of a black girl whose family must deal with the injustices and hatred they experience. So far, some of the children have said that it's a good book with great development of the character and how they perceive the world being broken around them.



In addition to these books, we would also recommend students to consider reading 'I am Malala' to support students in their study of Humanities. Malala Yousafzai, is a Pakistani female education activist and the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize laureate. Awarded when she was 17, she is the world's youngest

Nobel Prize laureate, and the second Pakistani and the first Pashtun to receive a Nobel Prize.

'I Am Malala' is the incredible true autobiography of a young Pakistani girl, Malala Yousafzai, who won the Noble Peace prize for fearlessly standing up for education in the face of the Taliban. She was shot in the head after refusing to back down from demanding for her right to an education.

Happy New Year!

I hope you all had a wonderful break and managed to get some well-deserved rest. We welcomed the students back on the 3rd January and it was a pleasure to see them all keen and ready to learn. As I discussed with you at the end of last term, I will be taking over the leadership of Year 10 for this term and the first part of the summer term. I am really looking forward to supporting Year 10 in what is a crucial time for them. I extremely proud of how they have started the term and I have visited numerous lessons and seen well motivated, enthusiastic and committed young learners.

Back to Basics

I have been speaking to the students about the importance of getting the basics right and what I mean by this is the fundamental key priorities that lay the foundation to being successful:

- Attendance I am always asked 'what is the single most important thing that determines a students' success at school?' and I always answer; 'attendance!' Good attendance is the number one factor that determines whether a student is successful in their exams. If students get this right then they stand a greater chance of being successful.
- Punctuality being on time is habit that colleges, 6th forms and employers are looking for in a young person. Ask any employer and they want people who are on time. Students often say 'it doesn't matter if I am one or two minutes late', however if you were catching a train it doesn't matter if you one, two or twenty minutes late you would still miss the train. Catching that train could be to that job interview you really want.
- Organisation planning ahead and knowing what lessons you have the next day and what homework needs to be completed shows initiative and again forms good habits, leaving tasks to the last minute creates stress and anxiety. My tips for organisation are simple; pack your bag the night

before, have a dedicated cupboard where you keep your workbooks and equipment. Check your Teams regularly for homework and deadlines.

Get the basics right and bigger things will take care of themselves



Attendance

As discussed previously attendance is key in a student's chance of success at school. This term 177 students have 100% attendance, I want to congratulate all of them for their dedication and commitment. Through my observations this term I am proud to see all of our students showing the right behaviours, treating each other and staff with respect and care. Our focus over the next two weeks is to 'think before we act'. Often our immediate reactions can lead to further frustration.



Uniform

Having a school uniform creates a sense of identity and shows we are proud to attend CHSG. On the whole the uniform in Year 10 is very good. Students often ask me 'why is uniform important?', 'it doesn't affect my learning'. Whilst I understand this point, most professions will require staff to dress in an appropriate manner therefore getting into good habits wearing the correct uniform, creating a sense of belonging and being proud to be part of a community all lead to being successful.

Personal Development

We take our students personal development very seriously. A good education is not just about getting good exam results, it is also important in developing students' character. We have a strong personal development programme (PDP) across the school.

Every afternoon our students follow a personal development curriculum. They cover a wide range of topics that support and prepare them for the next stage of their lives. In addition to this we also have 5 PDP drop down days where students are immersed in a variety of topics learning both from our staff and external providers.

Last week we had our 2nd Personal development Day. Year 10 have been looking at the following topics:

- Women's safety exploring issues of safety of women, including misogynistic lyrics in music











Literacy Focus


Literacy is a whole school priority, having good literacy skills is essential in any career. Year 10 Work Experience

A work placement is a child's opportunity to spend a period of time outside the classroom, learning about a particular job or area of work. Work experience can help your child decide on their options after year 11 and beyond. They will also get the chance to develop and show evidence of vital skills such as self-confidence, communication, independence and a variety of others, depending on what kind of placement they do.

Message from Mrs Phelps-Gardiner (Careers Lead) Year 10 Work Experience May 2023

As you are all aware our Year 10 students are in the process of finding work experience placements to be completed in May. The deadline is fast approaching for placements to be confirmed and we still have a number of students who have not secured a placement. Although we are able to offer help and guidance we do not have a bank of placements, all students need to approach employers to enquire for placements.

If your daughter has not yet managed to find anything can we ask that you have a conversation of where they have applied and suggest some ideas for them. We would like to remind students that the Year 10 Work experience placements do not need to be based on what they are considering as a future career path, there are not many Hospitals, Dentists or Police based employers that will allow work



experience at this age. If students are interested in these kinds of professions we encourage them to work within the community, for instance at a Nursery, Care home or School.

Form tutors will be spending some time next week highlighting the students that need further assistance and drop in sessions to assist those who do not yet have a placement will commence. The school's support for good punctuality

We place a strong emphasis on good punctuality; we support this by:

- Giving sanctions to students who arrive late to school or lessons.
- Informing parents, by automated call, if their child arrives late for school.
- Awarding achievement points to tutor groups where all students have arrived punctually over a period of time.
- Senior staff patrolling the local shops first thing in the morning to encourage students not to loiter in these areas and make themselves late.
- Sending attendance records home to parents each term so that parents can monitor any lateness.
- Addressing issues of poor time keeping with individual students and their parents.

Parents'/Carers' support for good punctuality

We would ask parents to support us in maintaining good punctuality by:

- Ensuring that their children get up in plenty of time to be ready and prepared for school.
- Ensuring their child has organised their bag and equipment the night before so that this does not delay departure in the morning.
- Discussing any issues of lateness to ensure this does not become a habit.
- Monitoring their child's attendance record when it is sent home and looking for patterns of lateness.

Parents and Carers: FAQs (frequently asked questions)

Why has my child been marked as absent for the whole morning when they arrived at 9.30am?

As stated above, DfE guidelines state that the register must be closed after a reasonable time in the morning. If arriving after 9.15am, a child will be marked as an unauthorised absence for the morning session.

Could I receive a fine if my child is persistently late?

If your child receives 10 or more unauthorised absences, you could be issued with a fixed penalty notice. This is £50 per parent if paid within 28 days, rising to £100 thereafter.

My child was only a couple of minutes late. It seems harsh that he/she should get a late mark

The school has to abide by the rules and expectations laid down for all schools. Lateness for school (or work) is a failure to arrive on time and will be marked as such. We would encourage students to set off in good time so that any small delay does not cause them to be late.

Our whole family overslept and it is not my child's fault that he/she is late. Will they receive a late mark?

This cannot be taken as an acceptable reason for lateness so a late mark or unauthorised absence would be recorded, depending on the time of arrival.

The school's support for good punctuality

My child has to catch the bus to school which is sometimes late. Will they receive a late mark?

Any lateness is recorded as thus on the register. We would advise that the child leaves earlier so that even if the bus is late, they will still arrive on time. If the bus is sometimes late, then it is not a reliable way to ensure arrival in good time.

Would you make any allowances for lateness if, for example, there were major traffic problems in the area perhaps because of an accident, so my car/the bus was unavoidably stuck in traffic?

The school cannot make allowances for the individual problem (however genuine it may be). However, it does take a view when there are known reported major problems that effect a large number of people; very heavy snowfall would be one such example.

What if I phone up/email to say my child is going to be late? Would he/she still get a late mark and detention?

Yes, they would still be marked late and receive a detention, but it is very helpful to know that you are aware and for us to know the expected time of arrival and reason for lateness.

If I know my child is going to be late, do I need to ring/send in a note?

It is very helpful if you do this. If your child is very late, they will be marked as unauthorised absence and your note may give an alternative acceptable reason to allow us to authorise the absence.
