It has been brought to our attention that some parents, carers and former students are taking to social media platforms to comment about incidents or events regarding our School. I would like to make it clear to everyone that we do not, and will not, respond to social media. We have a Complaints Policy, which can be found on our website. I would strongly encourage anyone who feels aggrieved to either contact us, visit us and talk to a member of staff, or in extreme cases use this policy rather than posting on social media. In doing so, it is far more likely to be brought to our attention for us to resolve, quickly.

We have also been informed about former students targeting the school and making false allegations about incidents that have alleged to have happened involving our students. We have spent time investigating each of these fully and they have turned out to be false. This obviously then becomes a huge waste of our resources when resources should be deployed in improving the educational outcomes and provision for our students.

Whilst there are many wonderful benefits to social media it can also be used by individuals to attempt to undermine the culture and community within a school. We know that many of the other schools across the borough are also affected in the same way, we are not alone, which is a shame. However, as always, I would ask all our parents and carers to make up their own minds before being potentially misled on social media.

Jo has always wanted to be a writer. She'll happily spend hours squirrelled away, working on her masterpieces, but with three sisters to contend with, a new friend who's just moved into her street and a father who's in Syria working as a humanist minister, there is a lot going on.

Becoming Jo is an excellent book to read especially when you are 9-14. This book is mainly about Jo and her 3 sisters - Meg, Beth and Amy. This book has a lot of ups and downs so be ready for a rollercoaster ride. The book starts with Jo and her family moving to a new town as they didn't have much because her dad was out of the country.

Becoming Jo is a marvellous modern retelling of Little Women. McKenzie (the author) has expertly captured the personalities of each of the sisters, and fans of the original will enjoy her clever little call-backs – from how Amy destroys Jo's manuscript this time around to the transformation from Laurie to Lateef. It's a joy to see how she puts a twist on the tale and makes it work in an up-to-date setting (and in the UK, too). But there's also plenty to enjoy for those new to the Marches, with McKenzie's tale covering themes of identity, making plans, family relationships, romance, bullying and health.

Becoming Jo might pack a lot in, but it does it with style. Becoming Jo perfectly captures the magic, exuberance and spirit of the original and much-loved book. Over 150 years after its publication, Becoming Jo proves just how timeless the characters and themes found within Little Women really are.
