

This is only a few incidents of excellence this year. Our Year 8 Netball team won the borough league and our football team have also been triumphant. We've had our first taste of a CHSG sports day up at the David Weir Centre where the twins, Stacey and Tracey, battled it out for 1st place in the 100 meters.







We've seen the Year group receive 12,741 rewards for upholding school values, and 6,901 Golden tickets being awarded to our students for their excellent

effort in class. Our students have also held the title of student receptionists all year long and seen them show a calm and mature approach to year 8. Last week saw our final set of exams for the year and our students seem to have taken them in their stride. The levels of anxiety around assessments has reduced and this calm manner seems to be positively impacting the outcomes in our lessons.



Literacy focus



This week, we review "A Single Shard" by Linda Sue Park.

In this Newbery Medal-winning book set in 12th century Korea, Tree-ear, a 13-year-old orphan, lives under a bridge in Ch'ulp'o, a potters' village famed for delicate celadon ware. He has become fascinated with the

potter's craft; he wants nothing more than to watch master potter Min at work, and he dreams of making a pot of his own someday. When Min takes Treeear on as his helper, Tree-ear is elated -- until he finds obstacles in his path: the backbreaking labour of digging and hauling clay, Min's irascible temper, and his own ignorance. But Tree-ear is determined to prove himself -- even if it means taking a long, solitary journey on foot to present Min's work in the hope of a royal commission...even if it means arriving at the royal court with nothing to show but a single celadon shard.

One student has said that the book was helpful about teaching you some of the values you will need in your life.

Tutor reads continues in Year 9 giving our students the opportunity to improve their literacy, oracy and written skills in their lessons.



Megan C 10R2 has been successful in becoming a member of the Fearless Youth Panel despite hundreds of applications.

Fearless is the dedicated youth service of the independent charity Crimestoppers. They provide young people with the opportunity to give information about crime 100% anonymously. Young people can give information to Fearless using their online form or by calling Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.



Fearless cannot track your IP address or your phone number and they will not ask for your name, age or any other identifying questions. They have no way of knowing who has contacted them.

After receiving your completed form or your call, they create a report, ensuring it doesn't contain any info that could identify you, which is then sent on to the relevant authority with the legal responsibility to review the information that has been passed to them.

Trips and visits

Year 10 Geography trip to Stratford Olympic Park

On Tuesday 27th June, Year 10 Geography students travelled to Stratford Olympic Park to conduct their Geography fieldwork.

Fieldwork is an integral part of the students' Paper 3 and they will be asked questions around what methodologies and sampling strategies they used.

The students assessed the environmental quality at 3 sites and conducted a questionnaire to find out whether people in Stratford found that there were any positives and negatives to the regeneration that happened here in 2012. This example is also a case study of urban regeneration that the students had previously studied in their Geography lessons.

They were able to practice their fieldwork skills, and they will be working on writing up their findings in their Geography lessons for the rest of this term.

Year 10 Computer Science Trip

Year 10 Computer Science students attended an exclusive trip to the National Museum of Computing.



The National Museum of Computing (TNMOC) is home to the world's largest collection of working historic computers. Students were provided with large-scale, real-life applications for concepts that are covered in the curriculum using their unique collection of historically significant machines. Students were able to take part in a number of exhilarating activities which include:

- Codename Cipher: Solve real-life encryption problems and represent characters in 5 bit binary
- Enigmatic encounters: Apply customer code wheels to build understanding of WW2 encryption methods
- BBC Basic: programme like it's the 80's
- Private guided Tour: Guided tours which focus on WW2 Cryptography and Modern Electronic computing

As a bonus for their hard work and exceptional behaviour throughout the year, the students also visited Planet Ice where they were able to take part in ice-skating for the remaining time of the day which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.
