Student Leadership Conference

On Monday 18th November we hosted our Student Leadership conference. All of our student leaders from Year 7-13 attended a talk led by the founder of the popular wellbeing app Luna. The Luna team had just returned from a successful week of pitching their app to companies in America in order to grow further and support more young people. The talk covered topics including resilience, tips for starting a business, the importance of female leaders and the challenges female leaders face. It was incredibly inspiring and the girls asked very insightful questions. Well done to all those involved.

All kindness ambassadors and house captains have now completed training to ensure they are equipped for their roles as leaders. In the Kindness Ambassador Training and Leadership session, students learned to cultivate empathy, effectively communicate with each other, and developed teamwork skills to create a positive and inclusive environment in their schools and communities. They were trained to identify opportunities for acts of kindness and inspire others through role modeling and planning leadership initiatives. The session gave participants strategies to address bullying, foster mutual respect, and organize kindness campaigns, empowering them to be proactive changemakers who lead by example. Film Studies

Student Judges Italian Film Festival!

Through her placement at the BFI Future Film Academy last year, Violet C (Year 13 Film Studies) took up a place as a juror at the Giffoni International Film Festival in Italy in the summer! The Giffoni Film Festival is an annual event that showcases films aimed at children and young people. As part of the exchange programme for this event, Violet's family will host an Italian student for the duration of the London Film Festival in February. The BFI Future Film Academy is an event run by the British Film Institute every year that introduces young people to working in the film industry. Competition for places is always high, but Violet is the latest in a line of A Level Film students from CHSG to secure a place on the programme – her experience in Italy this summer shows some of the additional opportunities it opens up for students.

Violet wrote about her experience: "Over the summer, I was invited to take part in the Giffoni film festival opportunity as a judge on a jury of other 16+ people from all over the world including Italy, Macedonia, Germany, Pakistan, the UK and more. As an international festival, I learned a lot about the different cultures especially surrounding films as the ones watched in competition were from a variety of places regarding a plethora of issues and storylines. For my role I had to watch and debate the films then vote at the end for the best one. Over the 10 days I spent time completing workshops and other events with my Italian host Andrea. She will come to the UK in February 2025 for the BFI London film festival. It was a truly unforgettable experience".

The second is a more recent opportunity for those who wish to help with a pioneering effort: the new CHSG Community Library. In the first instance, Year 12 students will be working with Year 13 Chief Librarians to set up the library, its loan systems and personnel. They will also be a helper to Miss Trout, Assistant Head of English, with the whole school Wider Reading curriculum. They will gain valuable skills in organisation and people management, as well as being a key contributor to the already flourishing reading culture at CHSG. We cannot wait to see the impact of these initiatives.



Maths

The Maths department is very proud of our Year 12 Mathematicians for participating in Senior Maths Challenge 2024 and setting an example for the rest of the school to follow. All the participants volunteered to take part in the UKMT Maths Challenge that tested their mathematical ability, fluency and reasoning through 25 multiple-choice, problem-solving questions in 90 minutes. We are very proud of Ezel S who led the way and was awarded Best in School. Their success was celebrated in the Sixth Form Assembly and the news was shared with the rest of the school through the displays in the Maths Corridor.
