Lessons from Auschwitz

On Thursday 29th February, we had the opportunity to visit Poland for the day and learn more about the Holocaust. The Holocaust was the murder of approximately 6 million Jewish men, women and children by Nazi Germany and its collaborators. This took place during World War 2 within Germany and surrounding countries in daily life and camps, such as Auschwitz, which we had the opportunity to visit.







Before that we visited the town Oświęcim, which during the war was renamed Auschwitz. It had a thriving Jewish community prior to the Holocaust. The town had 12,000 occupants, of whom 8,000 were Jewish, and they lived very normal lives. We visited the only synagogue to remain, out of 27 originally. What is amazing about the synagogue is that just across the square is a church, highlighting how close the Jewish people in Poland lived alongside other religions and races. This was an important lesson during the project because we often assume that Jewish people lived very segregated lives, but they lived in harmony with other people and were a very diverse community themselves. The effects of the Holocaust were devastating on the town and the country. Today, out of the 40,000 that live in Oświęcim none of them are Jewish, and in Poland as a whole there were 3.5 million Jews before the war and today there are only 5,000.

Did you know that Auschwitz was actually made up of 45 different camps? We visited Auschwitz I, with its prominent gate, and Auschwitz - Birkenau, with the well-known train tracks. At Auschwitz I there is a book of names that contains over 4 million of the people killed in the Holocaust. It was shocking to see how many of those names must have been family with the same surname, killed not only in Auschwitz but across mainland Europe. Also in the first camp is the shoes display, but that was not the most shocking display we saw. We found it moving to see the collection of all the pots and pans that the



families had brought with them, thinking they were going to cook for their families. It highlights just how unaware they were of where they were going. In Birkenau, there was place for around 60,000 men in one part of the camp, across 171 barracks. To get across the size, when we were stood at one side, we could not see the end of the camp at all. We took part in a memorial led by Rabbi Marcus at the end of our day. He sang a traditional Jewish funeral song and we were able to all light a candle in memorial.

Also, as part of our project, we heard from a Holocaust survivor, Eva Clarke. She was actually born in Mauthausen, after her mother had been pregnant whilst working at both Auschwitz and another camp. She had an amazing survival story, and you can read more about her story, online or in her book: 'Born Survivors.'

We are really grateful for the opportunity, and highly recommend if you get the opportunity you should visit.
