

HOW IS THE GCSE COURSE STRUCTURED?


• Component I: Over the duration of year 10 and 11 you will complete 2 units of work. All work completed during this time, both in lessons and out of lessons, will be assessed and worth 60% of your final mark. This will take the form of 2 projects.

Component 2: This is an assignment set externally by AQA with choice of starting points/themes. You will have approximately 12 weeks to complete the work, followed by a 10 hour exam to be completed over two days.



What does the GCSE Photography exam look like?





There is no written exam in Art, but a practical one instead. You will be in the art room over 2 days (taking the usual breaks), creating a piece of work which you will have planned over a few weeks.

Develop ideas through investigations, demonstrating critical understanding of sources.

Evidence could include:

- Research about different artists, designers, cultures.
- Analysing and evaluating the work of others
- Creating your own copies and pieces inspired by others

- Experimentations with a range of different materials and techniques.
- Modifying and refining your ideas to show development and improvement
- Plan, design sketches and ideas.

Evidence could include:

- Taking your own primary photographs
- Drawing for different purpose: communicating, designing, observing.
- Annotations and explanations of your own work.
- Mind maps.

Evidence could include:


- Final pieces which respond to your theme and intent
- Evaluating and analysing your own work/journey.

Why should I study Photography?



Our creative industries not only fly the flag for the best of British creativity at home and abroad but they are also at the heart of our economy.

value of the creative industries to the UK is up from £94.8 billion in 2016 to £101.5 billion, and has grown at nearly twice the rate of the economy since 2010. It is now worth more than £130 billion. Surgery students 'losing dexterity to stitch patients'- Roger Kneebone, professor of surgical education at Imperial College, London, who teaches surgery to medical students, says young people need to have a more rounded education, including creative and artistic subjects, where they learn to use their hands.
