A Proven Record of High Achievement

There is a continuing strong trend of improvement in examination results at both Post 16 and GCSE, proving that the school has high expectations and the capacity to ensure that students of **all** abilities achieve. We set aspirational and ambitious targets for all our students.

GCSE

In 2022 student outcomes were strong. On average Carshalton High School for Girls students make a third of a grade better progress compared to other schools.

Over **68%** of students achieved 9 - 4 in English and Maths at GCSE.

Students at GCSE and ‘A’ Level make good progress regardless of their starting point.

Unique Selling Points: Single Sex Education & the Girls’ Learning Trust

Extensive research shows that girls achieve better in single sex schools, especially once they reach adolescence. Studies undertaken on behalf of the Good Schools Guide conclude:

“Girls are far more likely to thrive, get GCSE’s and stay in education if they go to a single sex school. Those at girls’ schools consistently make more progress than those in co-ed secondaries.”

A study by the Economic Journal also concluded that single-sex schools are more likely to produce high-flying career women. The research highlights that the benefits for learners in an all-girls environment are:

- ★ Less distraction and improved confidence
- ★ Willingness to take risks in the classroom
- ★ Greater belief by learners that they can succeed in subjects such as Maths and Science.

We are part of the Girls’ Learning Trust (GLT) with Nonsuch and Wallington High Schools, the only Multi-Academy Trust in the country made up of girls’ schools with a specific focus on improving education provision and opportunities for girls.

Excellent Governance and Leadership across the School

Ofsted 2017 identified that:

“The headteacher and senior leadership team are strongly focused on providing a high quality education where the school is, in the words of its vision statement, ‘a twenty first century centre of excellence.’” (Ofsted 2017)

There is highly experienced leadership at all levels within the school focused on securing continuous improvement.

A Welcoming, Friendly, Safe Environment

We pride ourselves on securing a safe, welcoming, friendly environment. Respect for others and the school facilities are the norm and there are high expectations with regard to student behaviour, both inside and outside of school. Visitors frequently comment on the calm, friendly, welcoming atmosphere of the school and the courtesy and good, positive behaviour of students. Students clearly state they feel safe in school.

High Quality Learning and Teaching

Learning and teaching on a daily basis is of extremely high quality. Students are inspired in their lessons through excellent teaching and active learning which is specifically designed around a ‘Girl Friendly Pedagogy’ framework. Homework is set regularly to support and reinforce learning and develop independent learning skills.

Excellent Provision through a Personalised Curriculum

As a school we constantly review and develop our curriculum to meet both external requirements and the needs of our students. Despite significant changes imposed in recent years, the school has embraced this challenge and been successful in improving the outcomes for all our students, ensuring that the curriculum remains broad and balanced.

Outstanding Care, Guidance and Support

Our care, guidance and support for students is Outstanding. Ensuring students are happy and their well-being is at the heart of our ethos, as we understand a happy learner is far more likely to succeed. We have a very strong pastoral care system and a culture embedded across the school of staff ‘going the extra distance’ for our students.

This is a good school
